What is Camp HOPE?

Camp HOPE is a specialized summer camp for children impacted by domestic and sexual violence. Thanks to the generosity of donors, the camp is completely free for families. Participants engage in outdoor activities, team-building exercises, and personal growth activities, all within a safe and trauma-informed environment.

At Camp HOPE, kids find:

- Safety in a supportive, healing environment
- Connection through mentorship and peer bonding

- Resilience through activities that build confidence and coping skills
- Hope—with proven outcomes like reduced anxiety and stronger emotional well-being

Camp HOPE is an important part of InterAct's mission to break the cycle of violence, beginning with the next generation.



The Raleigh Housing Authority - Has provided safe, quality, affordable housing to low- and moderateincome families in the greater Raleigh community since 1938.


